### **Course Description and Prerequisites**

Provides an examination of the various psychological disorders as well as theoretical, clinical, and experimental perspectives of the study of psychopathology. Emphasis on terminology, classification, etiology, assessment, and treatment of the major disorders. Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to distinguish between normal and abnormal behavior patterns as well as demonstrate knowledge of etiology, symptoms, and applicable therapeutic techniques for the various mental disorders. (Prerequisite: CSL 515

### **Course Objectives**

- Introduce students to historical and current understandings of abnormal psychology by:
  - Identifying the major historical developments in understanding abnormal behavior and evaluating them from a biblical perspective (2.F.1.a)
  - Identifying the dimensional approach to diagnosis, developmental and lifespan considerations, gender differences, understanding abnormal behavior and evaluating it from a biblical perspective
- Introduce students to the current assessment, classification, and diagnostic methods used for mental disorders by:
  - Identifying current assessment techniques and forensic uses (2.F.7.e; 2.F.7.l)
  - Understanding the diagnostic process including differential diagnosis (5.F.2.d)
  - Demonstrating an understanding of the types of disorders in The Diagnostic and Statistical Manual of Mental Disorder Fifth Edition (DSM-5)
- Assist students in developing an understanding of the major emotional, personality, cognitive, developmental, sexual, physical, and substance-related disorders by:
  - Identifying the diagnostic criteria for the *DSM-5* disorders
  - Describing the potential biological, psychological, sociocultural, and spiritual factors involved in the etiology of the DSM-5 disorders (2.F.2.d)
  - Identifying treatment options available for the *DSM-5* disorders
  - Creating a bibliography of Christian publications for future use in ministry (2.F.2.g)
  - Demonstrating an understanding of the prevalence, development, and course of a disorder

# **Course/Classroom Policies and Information**

<u>Attendance and Participation</u>: Attendance and Participation will be graded through an online response to a discussion prompt for each chapter.

<u>Exams</u>: Exam questions will be taken from the assigned textbook chapters and class notes. The Final Exam is cumulative.

<u>Written Assignment: The Historical Development of The Diagnostic and Statistical Manual of Mental Disorders</u> (<u>DSM</u>): Write a two to three page paper summarizing the historical development of the Diagnostic and Statistical Manual of Mental Disorders.

<u>Written Assignment: Bibliography:</u> You are to develop annotated bibliographies for six disorders which include Christian resources. Each disorder should have a minimum of five resources. Please do not use resources which are more than ten years old. You should also include a brief summary of each assigned disorder.

<u>Written Assignment: Research Paper</u>: You are to write a research paper on one of the disorders which were assigned to you for developing an annotated bibliography. The research paper should be ten to twelve pages in content length and use eight to ten different journal sources (no more than five years old). The research paper should include definitions, descriptions, recent statistics, and etiology of the psychological issues; how the psychological issues relates to Christians; and how you, as a Christian counselor, can minister to the issues in biblical and practical ways including specific examples.

#### **Attendance**

Students are responsible for enrolling in courses for which they anticipate being able to participate weekly during the weeks appearing on course schedules, and then making every effort to do so. Such participation may include the following: completing quizzes or exams; emailing faculty or class members as part of an assignment; discussion board posting or response; turning in an assignment; or other communication reflecting ongoing learning in the course.
