Course Description and Prerequisites

An in-depth analysis of selected topics related to missions and evangelism. Such topics may include historical movements, methods, and cross-cultural techniques employed in the spread of the gospel. (Course may be repeated for credit when the topic of study differs; Prerequisite may be taken concurrently: EMS 205)

Course Objectives

- 1. Develop a love and respect for Muslim peoples and their cultures.
- 2. Demonstrate knowledge of the origins of Islam as a tradition that emerges in conversation with biblical topics and theology.
- 3. Demonstrate knowledge of the primary sources of authority for Muslims (e.g., the Qur'an, hadith, etc.).
- 4. Demonstrate knowledge of Muslim arguments against core Christian teachings and biblical responses to those arguments.
- 5. Explore and critique select issues involved in evangelizing, church planting, and contextualizing the gospel among Muslim people groups.

Course Requirements and Assignments

- A. **PARTICIPATION (10%):** Active participation in discussions, in-class readings, the mosque visit, etc., is expected and absences will negatively impact your participation grade even if excused (you can't participate if you're not present).
- B. **READING QUIZZES (20%):** During the first half of the course, five quizzes be administered to determine the student's comprehension and mastery of the Reynolds and Qureshi books (see the schedule below). The quizzes are **open book**. Late assignments will receive a zero, and there will be **no** make-up quizzes for any reason; however, your lowest quiz grade will be dropped. The quiz is due at **midnight** before the following class period.
- C. **MID-TERM EXAM (10%):** Students are required to complete a mid-term exam covering the first part of the course during the scheduled time.
- D. **CONTENT SUMMARIES (50%):** Each student is required to read the following chapters/articles and write content summaries over each (see the schedule below). Each summary is to be **1-2 single-spaced** pages (maximum) and should be uploaded by the due date in **PDF format**. No cover page is necessary, but students should put their name and the article title/chapters they're summarizing at the top. The goal of this assignment is to summarize concisely, in the student's own words, the content of what they're reading. Late assignments will receive a zero, and there will be **no** make-ups for any reason; however, your lowest grade will be dropped. Additionally, students will be assigned a chapter/article and required to lead the class in a discussion of the ideas presented in the work.

- 2. BLOG ON MOSQUE VISIT (10%): During the designated week in the course schedule, we will visit a mosque. We will meet at the location during the scheduled class time and students will be required to arrange their own transportation. After the visit, students are to write a 600-800 word blog post for a Christian audience (e.g., your local church, life group, etc.) wherein you talk about (1) basic Muslim beliefs, (2) what it's like to visit a mosque, and (3) what Christians in the US can do to be a witness to their Muslim neighbors. No cover page is necessary; however, the blog post must have your name, a title, and be uploaded to Canvas in PDF format by the due date in the schedule.
