Course Description and Prerequisites

A continuation of Arabic I, focusing on the four language skills, listening, reading, writing and speaking, with a study of Arab culture and civilization. (Prerequisite: ARB 301)

Course Objectives

- Demonstrate the ability to speak about yourself, your life, and your environment.
- Demonstrate the ability to read simple, authentic texts on familiar topics and understand the main ideas.
- Demonstrate the ability to comprehend and produce basic Arabic sentence structures.
- Demonstrate familiarity with the differences between formal and spoken Arabic.

Required Textbooks

Students are **required** to purchase online access to the publisher's website, SmartSparrow. A link for registering in the correct section of the course will be provided on Canvas.

Course Requirements and Assignments

- A. **PARTICIPATION (10%):** Class time will be spent activating the skills, vocabulary, and dialogues you learn in your textbook and online. All absences, whether "excused" or not, will result in a reduction of your participation grade. Attendance is crucial to your success!
- B. **ONLINE HOMEWORK (30%):** Students are required to complete ALL online exercises on the SmartSparrow website. You will be given a link to register in the correct section of the course at the beginning of the semester. Students are graded based upon their progress in completing the online work, not for getting the correct answers. Students should self-correct their work using the answer key

provided by the professor. No make-ups will be allowed, but your lowest lesson grade will be dropped.

- C. WRITTEN ASSIGNMENTS (30%): Some exercises have a written component. These must be completed by the due dates and handed in at the start of class. Students are graded based upon their progress in completing the written work, not for getting the correct answers. Students should self-correct their work using the answer key provided by the professor. No make-ups will be allowed, but your lowest lesson grade will be dropped.
- D. QUIZZES (10%): An in-class quiz will be administered at the end of each lesson (5 total for the semester). Students must be present to complete the exam. No make-ups will be allowed, but your lowest grade will be dropped.
- E. **MID-TERM EXAM (10%):** A mid-term exam, including a written and oral component, will be administered covering the first half of the course. See course schedule for details.
- F. **FINAL EXAM (10%):** A final exam, including a written and oral component, and will be administered during exam week. See course schedule for details.

Class Attendance

Students are responsible for enrolling in courses for which they anticipate being able to attend every class session on the day and time appearing on course schedules, and then making every effort to do so. When unavoidable situations result in absence or tardiness, students are responsible for acquiring any information missed. Professors are not obliged to allow students to make up missed work.
