Course Description and Prerequisites

An advanced study of the Jewish and Greco-Roman historical, social, and literary contexts of the New Testament. (Prerequisites: NTS 501, NTS 601)

Course Objectives

The student who successfully completes this course will:

- A. Be familiar with 2nd Temple documents and texts that are relevant to understanding and interpreting the NT.
- B. Recognize the key personalities, sects, and institutions of NT times.
- C. Be able to give an accurate account of salvation history from ca 586BC-AD100,
- D. Understand the importance of knowing the socio-political context of the NT.
- E. Be aware of the main scholarly resources available that deal with this period.

B. Hanson, K. C. and Douglas E. Oakman. Palestine in the Time of Jesus, 2nd ed. (Minneapolis: Fortress, 2008).

Course Requirements and Assignments

A. READING AND QUIZZES Weekly reading will be assigned from The Twelve Caesars. Quizzes covering the content of the assigned reading for the week will be administered at the beginning of each class session. Students are encouraged to prepare for these quizzes by mastering the major themes, points, arguments and evidence presented by each author. Cumulatively, the quizzes will comprise 20% of course grade.

B. Book Review. The student will read of Subversive Meals and write a 5-7 page review, which will include a summary of each chapter, give the strengths and weaknesses of the book, explain the unique

contribution(s) the book made to NT study, and tell how the book's content helped the student better understanding the NT. Due date April 19th. Counts 20% of course grade.

- C. Mid-term exam will be given on March 22, 2021 covering class lectures and textbook information. Counts for 30% each toward the semester grade.
- D. Discussion. Students will read each week assigned pages from "Palestine in the Time of Jesus" (Social Structures and Social Conflicts), 2nd ed. And be prepared to discuss the materials (counts 10% of course grade).
- E. Class Presentation. The student will be assigned a reading of one of the Dead Sea Scrolls. S/he will read it and give a report to the class on the nature and content of the scroll, and its relevance for NT study. Counts 20% of semester grade. See sign-up sheet.
- F. Attendance. Students are expected to attend all class sessions, both arriving on time and not leaving until the session is over. One absence per semester will be allowed without penalty. Two absences will lower the semester grade by 3 points; three absences will lower the semester grade by 6 points; four absences by 9 points. Five or more absences will result in failure of the course.

Course/Classroom Policies and Information

All computers, iPads, and cell phones must be put away during class to assure students can engage wholeheartedly in discussion. Students may record the class upon professor's approval.

Class Attendance

Students are responsible for enrolling in courses for which they anticipate being able to attend every class session on the day and time appearing on course schedules, and then making every effort to do so. When unavoidable situations result in absence or tardiness, students are responsible for acquiring any information missed. Professors are not obliged to allow students to make up missed work. Per their independent discretion, individual professors may determine how attendance affects students' ability to meet course learning objectives and whether attendance affects course grades.
