Course Description and Prerequisites

A survey of intertestamental history, an introduction to the canon and text of the New Testament, and an introduction to the historical background and content of the Gospels and Acts.

Course Objectives

At the end of the course, the student should demonstrate the following:

- 1. A general knowledge of events in Palestine from 586 BC to AD 70 and their significance, with special focus on 323 BC to AD 40.
- 2. An understanding of introductory issues related to the Gospels and Acts, including their historical background and context.
- 3. A knowledge of the content and structure of each of the Gospels and Acts.

Required Textbooks

- 1. A copy of (or digital access to) an English translation of the Bible. Please choose from one of the following translations: ESV, HCSB, NASB, NET, NIV, NKJV, RSV

- 4. The professor will post notes or link to articles occasionally throughout the semester that are required reading. Make sure to follow Canvas for all assignments.

Course Requirements and Assignments

- 1. Weekly reading and writing (50%): Students will be assigned reading for each class period and weekly writing assignments connected to the reading. These writing assignments are designed to guide the student in summarizing, absorbing, and reflecting on the reading. Each week's assignment will be posted on Canvas and may include completing workbook pages and/or questions or writing prompts in a Canvas quiz. The writing assignments will be open-book and are due by class time on Thursdays. The lowest two grades will be dropped.
- 2. **Exam 1 (20%):** The exam falls mid semester and covers intertestamental history, Jewish context, and Jewish literature. Students will be provided a detailed study guide and the specifics will be discussed in class. Exams are taken on Canvas.
- 3. **Exam 2 (20%):** The second exam will be taken during finals week and covers the material from the second unit (Canon, Gospels, and Acts). Students will be provided a detailed study guide and the specifics will be discussed in class. Exams are taken on Canvas.
- 4. **Class participation (10%):** Students are expected to be present and attentive during class time. Class participation points are awarded based on attendance (see attendance policy) and appropriate class interaction. This assessment takes into account various personality styles and learning differences.

Course/Classroom Policies and Information

- 1. Be present, attentive, and respectful during class time. Avoid excessive tardiness.
- 2. Silence all devices during class time and put away distractions (social media, games, etc.). Please only respond to emergency messages or calls.
- 3. Avoid distracting your classmates and/or professor. If you must leave the room during class time or you arrive late, please do so as quietly as possible. If you need to talk to your classmates, wait for the break or after class. If the professor has to speak with you about disrupting class, you've already lost points.
- 4. Questions about the topic at hand are welcome and enhance the learning experience for the whole class. Do not hesitate to ask questions during class. For "off-topic" questions unrelated to the course or the unit being studied, the professor is happy to discuss outside of class time. Speak with the professor to arrange an appointment.
- 5. Follow Canvas carefully for daily assignments and course schedule.
- 6. When uploading assignments to Canvas, use scanned/PDF documents or Microsoft Word documents rather than JPEG or pictures.
- 7. **Late assignments will receive a 10 point deduction for each day late.** Turning in an assignment after the time it is due but on the due date = one day late.
- 8. You are required to follow all COVID guidelines set by the college while in our classroom. *When working remotely:*
- 10. Obtain the appropriate accommodation from Students Services for remote learning. In emergencies or special circumstances, you may email the professor to request *one day* of remote learning.
- 11. Join the Zoom call at least five minutes early to address any issues. Join with your video on if possible.
- 12. Be prepared to navigate Canvas and Zoom, print materials, and scan and upload assignments.

Class Attendance

Students are responsible for enrolling in courses for which they anticipate being able to attend every class session on the day and time appearing on course schedules, and then making every effort to do so. When unavoidable situations result in absence or tardiness, students are responsible for acquiring any information missed. Instructors are not obliged to allow students to make up missed work. Per their independent discretion, individual instructors may determine how attendance affects students' ability to meet course learning objectives and whether attendance affects course grades.

Up to two excused absences will be allowed for emergencies (sickness, etc.) Unexcused or excessive absences will impact the student's class participation grade. More than three absences will result in a full letter grade reduction.

Incomplete Grades
