## **Course Description and Prerequisites**

An introduction to the oral presentation of the gospel to the individual, including personal spiritual preparation for the task. Biblical foundations and demands for evangelism provide the basis of study. (Prerequisite may be taken concurrently: THS 101)

## **Course Objectives**

The student who successfully completes this course will demonstrate the ability to:

- 1. Explain the facts and terms of the Gospel to others.
- 2. Outline the guidelines and principles used by first century believers to evangelize the lost.
- 3. Write his/her personal testimony in preparation for use in gospel presentations.
- 4. Analyze personal evangelism methodologies for preparation of the task.
- 5. Evaluate and journal witnessing encounters.

## **Course Requirements and Assignments**

1. *Personal Testimony (10%)*: The student is required to prepare a written personal testimony (3-5 pages double spaced) in preparation to effectively articulate his/ her personal testimony in witnessing encounters during the semester. The testimony should be divided into three sections: 1) My life before Christ, 2) How I came to trust Christ as my Savior, 3) How my life has changed as a result. Write the testimony as if giving it to a non-Christian audience. Avoid using religious jargon. Submit written Personal Testimony in Canvas.

Due date February 07, 2022 @ 11:59pm

Note: All written assignments must be presented in the writing style outlined in the *Criswell College Manual* of *Style*, third edition, Dallas.

**2.** Assigned Textbook Chapter Readings (10%): Each student will be required to read all assigned chapters in the course textbook, *The Master Plan of Evangelism, by Robert Coleman*. Note: The student is required to read the assigned chapters each week. See Course Outline for Chapter Reading assignments. Report the percentage of the reading of the book in Canvas. Submit Reading Report in Canvas. Due date: March 7, 2022 @11:59pm.

**3**. Assigned Textbook Chapter Readings (10%): Each student will be required to read all assigned chapters in course textbook, Whosoever Will: A Biblical-Theological Critique of Five-Point Calvinism, by David Allen and Steve Lemke. See Course outline for chapter reading assignments. Note: The student is required to read the assigned chapter each week. Report the percentage of the reading of the book in blackboard. Submit Reading Report in Canvas. Due date: April 25, 2022 @ 11:59pm

**4.** Book Review (20%): The student is required to write a critical evaluation of *Evangelism and the Sovereignty of God*, J.I. Packer. The book review shall be 5-7 pages in length and include the following: 1) A summarization of each chapter, (3-4 pages), 2) The strengths and weaknesses of the book (be specific) (1-2 pages), and 3) An explanation how the book was helpful to you (1 page). Submit Book Review in Canvas. Due date: February 28, 2022 @ 11:59pm.

Note: All written assignments must be presented in the writing style outlined in the *Criswell College Manual* of Style, third edition, Dallas.

**5. Class Discussion Threads**: Each student is required to participate in 4 class discussion threads during the semester. In order to receive full credit for the 4 class discussion threads, each student must read the article assigned and respond by Wednesday at 11:59P.M. of that week. Next, the student must respond to at least two other students' posts by Friday at 11:59 P.M. of that same week. Finally, the student must answer any questions that are asked of him/her by other students by the following week on Monday at 11:59P.M. in your time zone at the end of that week. Please be courteous to other classmates by not waiting until the last minute each week to post on the Discussion Board. Counts 5% of final grade.

5. Examination Requirements: Midterm Exam (20%) and Final Exam (20%). The midterm will be given approximately eight weeks into the semester, and will cover the class notes and Course Textbooks, plus chapters 1-2 of The Effective Invitation. A review will be given for the mid-term. Midterm Exam due in Canvas 03/10/22 @ 11:59pm. A final exam will be given covering the remainder of the class notes, Course Textbooks, and chapter 11 of The Effective Invitation. A review will be given for the final exam. Final Exam due in Canvas: 05/12/22 @ 11:59pm. (Note: There will be 50 questions in 60 minutes. It is open textbooks and lectures for both exams.) Note: Graduating Seniors: Final Exam in Canvas 04/25/22 @ 11:59pm.

6. Witnessing Journal (5%). (1) a prayer list of people that you are currently praying for gospel conversations and for their salvation (minimum of one-half page in length). (2) life application of how you plan to share the gospel with them and other people in the future (minimum of one page in length). Note: Due to the Coronavirus Pandemic and social distancing measures, students are encouraged to follow social distancing measures during this Spring semester 2022.

Submit Witnessing Journal in Canvas. Due date: May 02, 2022 @ 11:59pm. Counts 5% of semester grade. Note: Graduating Seniors: Witnessing Journal in Canvas 04/25/22 @ 11:59pm. Note: All written assignments must be presented in the writing style outlined in the *Criswell College Manual* of Style, third edition, Dallas.

7. Assessment: Initial, Mid-semester & Final Definitions of Evangelism (0%: Complete/Incomplete). The student is required to write out his/her initial, mid-semester and final personal definitions of evangelism. Each definition of evangelism (one sentence) and life application of evangelism (one paragraph) will be due at the beginning, mid-semester and end of the semester. Initial Definition of Evangelism due date: 01/24/22 @ 11:59pm; Mid-Semester Definition of Evangelism due date: 03/07/22 @11:59pm; Final Definition of Evangelism due date: 05/09/22 @11:59pm.

Note: Graduating Seniors: Final Definition in Canvas 04/25/22 @ 11:59pm

Each definition will be graded so that the student can develop his/her definition during the semester. The student will receive complete/incomplete grade for each definition. This assignment does not count as a percentage of student's final semester grade.

Note: See Lecture Four for definitions of evangelism.

Each definition (of evangelism) and life application (of evangelism) will be graded based upon the following content and rubric scale:
