Course Description and Prerequisites

Research in the principles of effective evangelism. Attention is given to the biblical foundation and mandate to evangelize, personal spiritual preparation for the task, problems encountered in witnessing, the role of prayer and the Holy Spirit in evangelizing, and methods of follow-up and discipleship for the convert.

Course Objectives

The student who successfully completes this course will demonstrate the ability to:

- 1. Biblical Studies: Outline the guidelines and principles used by the early church to evangelize the lost.
- 2. Applied Studies: Write his/her personal testimony in preparation for use in gospel conversations.
- 3. Biblical, Theological and Applied Studies: Analyze evangelism and discipleship methodologies for preparation of the task.
- 4. Integration: Research and evaluate the life of one ministry leader to assist the student in principles and application for evangelism in the twenty-first century.

Course Requirements and Assignments

1. **Personal Testimony (10%)**: The student is required to prepare a written personal testimony (3-5 pages double spaced) in preparation to effectively articulate his/ her personal testimony in gospel

conversations. The testimony should be divided into three sections: 1) My life before Christ, 2) How I came to trust Christ as my Savior, 3) How my life has changed as a result. Write the testimony as if giving it to a non-Christian audience. Avoid using religious jargon. Submit written Personal Testimony in Canvas. Due Date: August 29, 2022 @ 11:59pm.

<u>Form and Style:</u> Kate L. Turabian's *A Manual for Writers of Term Papers, Theses, and Dissertations*, 9th ed., must be consulted for proper form. Spelling, grammar, and punctuation will be considered in the grading.

- 2. Evangelism Journal (20%): All students are required to keep a weekly journal including:
 - (1) Prayer List: Write an active prayer list of lost people for whom you are praying this semester (first name only).
 - **(2) Relationship Building**: Write an active list of persons that you are building relationships for gospel conversations this semester (first name only).
 - **(3) Gospel Conversations Summary:** Write one-page brief, summary of one or more gospel conversations with people this semester (first name only).
 - **(4) Principles, Methods and Applications of Evangelism:** Write two principles of evangelism, two methods of evangelism and two applications of evangelism from assigned chapters of the Book of Acts, textbook readings, lectures, class discussions and research (see Course Outline).
 - **(5) Universal Questions to Assess Your Evangelism Methodology:** Write three universal questions to assess your evangelism methodology (See Lecture Fourteen PowerPoint Video).
 - **(6) Assignments by the Professor during the Lectures:** Students are required to journal additional assignments given by the professor during lectures.

Note: The Evangelism Journal should be a working document for students during the semester, but submitted in Canvas as one document uploaded with title page and page numbers. Due Date: December 9, 2022 @11:59pm.

- 3. Assigned Textbook Chapter Readings (10%): Each student will be required to read all assigned chapters in course textbook, The Master Plan of Discipleship, by Robert Coleman. See Course outline for chapter reading assignments. Note: The student is required to read the assigned chapter each week. Report the percentage of the reading of the book in Canvas.
 - Submit Reading Report in Canvas. Due date: September 26, 2022 @ 11:59pm.
- 4. Assigned Textbook Chapter Readings (10%): Each student will be required to read all assigned chapters in the course textbook, The Master Plan of Evangelism, by Robert Coleman. Note: The student is required to read the assigned chapters each week. See Course Outline for Chapter Reading assignments. Report the percentage of the reading of the book in Canvas.
 Submit Reading Report in Canvas. Due date: October 10, 2022@ 11:59pm.
- 5. **Book Review (20%)**: The student is required to write a critical evaluation of *The Gospel of Our King: Bible, Worldview, and the Mission of Every Christian* by Bruce Ashford and Heath Thomas. The book review shall be 5-7 pages in length and include the following: 1) A summarization of each chapter, (3-4 pages), 2) The strengths and weaknesses of the book (be specific) (1-2 pages), and 3) An explanation

how the book was helpful to you (1 page).

Submit Book Review in Canvas. Due date: November 07, 2022 @ 11:59pm.

<u>Form and Style:</u> Kate L. Turabian's *A Manual for Writers of Term Papers, Theses, and Dissertations*, 9th ed., must be consulted for proper form. Spelling, grammar, and punctuation will be considered in the grading.

- 6. Class Discussion Threads (10%): Each student is required to participate in ten class discussion threads during the semester. In order to receive full credit for the ten class discussion threads, each student must read the assignment and respond with an initial response thread by Wednesday at 11:55 P.M. of that week. Next, the student must respond to at least two other students' posts by Friday at 11:55 P.M. of that same week. Finally, the student must answer any questions that are asked of him/her by other students by Sunday at 11:55 P.M. in your time zone at the end of that week. Please be courteous to other classmates by not waiting until the last minute each week to post on the Discussion Board.
- 7. Research Paper (20%): Students will research the life and ministry of Billy Graham, (or one other ministry leader, approved by the professor), and write ten to twelve pages double-spaced research paper. You should have at least 12 references including books and journal articles including proper footnoting for graduate level research. The following outline should be observed:

Title page: Due date: 08/22/22 @ 11:59pm, Bibliography: Due date: 09/12/22 @11:59pm, Outline of Paper: Due date: 09/29/22 @ 11:59pm, Research paper: Due date: 12/05/22 @ 11:59pm.

- II. Body of Paper (9-10 page)
- A. Brief Bio of Ministry Leader (2 pages)
- B. Life and Work of the Ministry Leader (5-6 pages)
- C. Evaluation of the Ministry Leader (2-3 pages)
- III. Conclusion (1/2 page)
- 8. Assessment: Initial, Mid-semester & Final Definitions of Evangelism.

The student is required to write out his/her initial, mid-semester and final personal definitions of evangelism. Each definition of evangelism (one sentence) and life application of evangelism (one paragraph) will be due at the beginning, mid-semester and end of the semester in Canvas. Initial Definition of Evangelism due date: 08/15/22 @ 11:59pm in Canvas; Mid-Semester Definition of Evangelism due date: 10/10/22 @11:59pm in Canvas; Final Definition of Evangelism due date: 12/09/22 @11:59pm in Canvas. Each definition will be graded so that the student can develop his/her definition during the semester. The student will receive complete/incomplete grade for each definition. This assignment does not count as a percentage of student's final semester grade.

Online Course Information
